

## LEEN TIMES

Frosty nights and autumn is here, leaves changing, carpeting the ground and the veil in the woods fast clearing. Work on the farm never ceases. With maize silage going into the clamp and the final drilling of autumn cereals and broad beans, last spreading of muck and the final grazing by the cattle, the farm moves into winter mode. Milking still carries on morning and evening, every day, but further jobs are added— Feeding, bedding down, mucking out, it keeps on and on. The threat (and regulations) of Foot and Mouth gradually recede, only to be replaced by another raft of problems with Blue Tongue disease.

Building of the new cubicle house, dirty water lagoon and cow tracks have now been virtually completed, just leaving a mass of tidying up and fencing to finish that project. We now have scaffolding all round the end of the house, repairing the roof over some of it. Apart from the hammering and clatter, we have relocated a bit of wildlife and discovered an old mullion window that hasn't seen the light of day for many years. Vegetables have been (mostly) harvested (or ploughed in-as is the case this year!) leaving just the leeks to be harvested over winter. Wild life news: Mass of Swallows and Martins reported a week later than normal.

Blossom on an apple tree the day I was picking the fruit! A Heron flew off the other day from the river side leaving behind a flapping, good sized Trout (11/2lb), only a small puncture wound in the side, so popped it in the pan. It had some fairly well developed eggs in it but it was in good condition and it certainly tasted good! Nice to get one back for a change. Squirrels everywhere-they're having a good time of it- but I'm afraid we will have to start poisoning them- they are doing so much damage.

I keep watching for field mushrooms, ceps and chanterelles but so far—really disappointed. New grandson born!: Hugh Norman to Chris and Sarah, brother to Freddy- more farmers????

## YOUR VILLAGE GREEN

It is generally considered that the village green is a valuable asset of the village and provides unique opportunities for recreation and leisure for parishioners and visitors alike.

Recently a car parking area has been designated and plans are afoot to improve the entry area by filling the potholes before a more permanent solution is provided, possibly financed by a Kingspan Insulation Community Trust grant. In order to focus more time and energy on the maintenance and development of the potential of the green your Parish Council has decided to set up a Working Group which will report to the Council on maintenance matters, recommend and maintain a 5 year plan for the green and oversee any project work that is approved by the Council. The Working Group will consist of 6 parishioners, at least two of whom will be Councillors. Bob Pierce and I have agreed to fill the councillors' posts, Tony Norman with his widespread knowledge of local wildlife and the green has volunteered as one parishioner which leaves three to be recruited. If you are interested in the green and its development, have the time to attend occasional meetings, be available to possibly monitor or supervise work and would like to be a Group member then let me (388767) or Bob Pierce (388682) know.

Currently we are awaiting the result of a grant application to the Kingspan Insulation Community Trust for funds to develop the north east section of the green as a nature conservation area to protect and encourage local flora and fauna and complement the activity section on the northwest of the green.

## HEREFORD COUNCILLORS

### REPORT

#### Lady Hawkins School

This September the School celebrated the 375<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of its founding in 1632. Lady Hawkins, a daughter of the Vaughan family of Hergest Court, was the widow of Sir John Hawkins and left the bequest for a school in her will when she died in 1625. The Founders Day service held every year on or about the 29<sup>th</sup> September. This year the theme was Slavery and Freedom; this was particularly relevant as Sir John who as an Admiral of Queen Elizabeth the first's fleet not only fought the Spaniards but also was one of the founders of the Slave trade.

The School which is one of 14 High Schools in the County and is attended by 480 pupils has recently been awarded a Specialist College Status in Humanities in recognition of the excellence in Geography, History and English. The aims are to extend learning opportunities, broaden pupil experiences and understanding in a wider local, national and global context.

Lady Hawkins has always been proud of its strong community links and continues to have good results at both G.C.S.E and A Level.

#### Summer 2007

This has been a difficult summer for the County with record levels of rainfall having an impact on our tourism and infrastructure with over 2.5 million pounds worth of damage to Schools, Roads and Bridges. The Foot and Mouth and Blue Tongue outbreaks have been devastating for Farming with restrictions and collapse of livestock prices. The continual restrictions and lack of access to a genuine export market may have long-term consequences for our Community. Herefordshire landscape has long relied on the mixture of arable and livestock farming for its attractiveness and our Cattle and Sheep are important component in that. In my entire ward, which goes out to the Welsh Border, there are only 3 Dairy farmers producing milk. The Council is supporting the promotion for British Food and Farming in all our schools and we as consumers must ensure that the retailers are giving a fair price to the producer. Fairtrade is a concept not just for foreign goods but those produced at home as well.

#### Highways

I have reported to the Parish Council that the pothole team has been around the Parish roads. The Milton crossroad alterations which is a dangerous junction given the volume of traffic has now been completed but the length of time taken has been an issue. During the next month I have meetings with HGV operators and the Shobdon Aerodrome to discuss parishioner concerns.
