Everything you've wanted to know about computers, cameras and more....

Pembridge Community Access Point (CAP) is based in classroom 4 at the primary school. Run by volunteers, the CAP is currently open once a week (Thursday evenings, 6-9pm) and offers public access to computers, broadband internet access, digital cameras and knowledgeable volunteers to answer any questions, which you may have. Whether you have a computer at home or have never turned one on before, the CAP is there for you.

In 2008, there will be dedicated sessions for beginners, silver surfers (the over 60s) and digital photography enthusiasts led by a qualified and experienced tutor – all kicking off with sessions for beginners. Posters will go up in the local shops once details have been confirmed. Anyone interested in such sessions should contact Henry.

There will also be film nights once more at the village hall thanks to the CAP volunteers. The first one is planned for early May and details will follow nearer the time. Please note, car parking for the school is available in the playground, accessed from Bearwood Lane. Classroom 4 is also fully accessible to the disabled.

Village Green Project

The development of the North East corner of the village green has commenced with the production of a draft report by local environmental expert Dan Wenczek of Bearwood Associates Ltd.

Since the announcement of the project, which is under the auspices of the Parish Council, Doreen Furber, Geoff Lynn and Adrian Lomax have joined the Village Green Group to bring it up to full complement and a grant has been obtained from the Kingspan Community Trust to finance the work.

Before the Group can put forward any ideas of a concrete (not literally) nature to the Parish Council and parishioners for their views further inspections of the area need to be carried out in May and July to confirm what plant species exist in that area.

In addition, if any parishioners are aware of legal constraints or have other concerns that could affect how the conservation plan is formulated then please contact Cllr Bob Pierce or myself.

The latest contribution from the Kingspan Insulation Community Trust is helping to keep children using the play area at Shobdon safe. £650 was donated by the Trust to provide a self closing gate for the play area.

The play area at Shobdon is used by parents and toddlers as well as pupils from the nearby primary school and with its location on the main road the threat of cars is always on the minds of parents.

The entrance to the play area was so close to the main road that there wasn't space to manoeuvre prams into and out of the original gate without getting either parent or children perilously close to the traffic. A new layout for the entrance to the play area and a new safer gate was just the tonic that was required.

Ann Kent-Phillips clerk to the Parish council said "It is a fantastic thing what the Trust is doing and the residents of Shobdon are extremely grateful for all the assistance they have had.

The old gate at the play area had been vandalised and would no longer close, but thanks to funding from the Trust we have been able to purchase a metal self closing gate to keep our children safe."

The Kingspan Insulation Community Trust was set up in order to benefit the residents of the three Parishes of Shobdon, Pembridge and Kingsland. Funding can be given for projects that meet one of the Trust's four objectives which cover conservation, encouraging biodiversity, health and fitness of young people and road safety.


John Garbutt, chairman of the Trust said; "This is one of many projects the Trust has been able to provide funding for in Shobdon and we are delighted to see how many residents are benefitting from these worthwhile causes."

A fund of £25,000 is made available twice a year. The deadline for the next round of grants, for which applications are invited is March 31st, 2008.

Herefordshire Councillor's report Schools

Given the anxiety caused by the draft proposals last month I thought it proper to outline some of the background.

The funding that our schools receive via the Dedicated Schools Grant is determined by Central Government, based on pupil numbers. The review of schools was imposed on all local authorities by Government to address surplus places with the "carrot and stick" being future capital funding. It is probably worth pointing out that Herefordshire is the third lowest funded education service – we received £3,687 per pupil in the 2008/9 settlement.

If Herefordshire was funded at the average unitary council level, we would receive an extra £329 per pupil, worth £7.5million p.a. (based on 22,836 pupils).

I thought it worth giving you this background as it might help to explain the initial draft proposals. The mistake the council made was to allow the Directorate of Children's services to issue the draft proposals without political support and the backup of secure information to justify them. When Councillors discovered the poor evidence they were withdrawn.

At the Full Council meeting on Friday 8th February the proposals were formally rejected and an undertaking that no high schools or six forms would disappear or be merged within the lifetime of the current administration till 2011. In the case of primary schools only the existing small school policy remains which states that schools with below 46 pupils must start to work with the LEA, partners and the community to look for creative and local solutions in order for them to be safeguarded.

Pembridge School which receives high praise from Inspectors has 99 pupils is due to start a major refurbishing programme this term which will improve the facilities still further. Our local High School Lady Hawkins was inspected just before Christmas and was identified as a good school with a well performing six form. The numbers at the school are due to rise including the six form.

The upset that this has caused to our schools and communities is something I bitterly regret and will ensure that lessons have been learnt. This month I will be part of a delegation to see the schools Minister Jim Knight to make the case for our schools and rural provision.

Speeding though the Village




