Future Housing in Herefordshire

The Council has published a Local Development Framework paper looking at options for future house building in the County. Between 2001 and 2021 13,200 houses should be built in the County. While the majority will be built in Hereford and the Market Towns the provision of housing in rural areas is a particular issue for debate. The need to meet local housing needs and support local services is important. I believe that if we are to have sustainable communities in the future, homes for economically active people as well as mature citizens must be provided. Where those houses are placed and what size of Villages and Hamlets should have building sites needs proper discussion. The development of this strategy will take place over the next 18 months.

West Mercia Crime Survey

In a recent survey on our local Police 33% of Herefordshire residents said that the Police were doing a good job, 35% believed they were doing a fair job and 14% believed they were performing poorly. My ward which includes Pembridge was one of three wards which felt least positive about the Police and complained they didn't see uniformed officers.

Pembridge was also high in identifying speeding traffic as a community priority. I have written to the Chief Constable and the Divisional Commander to ask what they are going to do to improve the situation.

On a more positive note levels of crime are very low in the County with a reduction in household burglaries of over 50% in the past three years. Anti social behaviour, Criminal damage and Drug use and dealing are identified as some of the main priorities to tackle in the future.

GP Practices in Herefordshire

The Council's scrutiny committee has received a report on the County's GP surgeries. The 2007 patient survey showed that the vast majority of patients were happy with current access to GPs with current 24hr and 48hr access considered very good. Those who were not happy would like to see additional evening hours and Saturday opening.

The retendering of the Out of Hours service should allow Herefordshire PCT (Primary Care Trust) to increase the opening hours as well as providing an improved service at the County Hospital. There is general concern that the Government's proposals (Darzi report) for major Health Centres or Polyclinics are not best suited for rural areas and our local GP surgeries, Community and Acute Hospitals are a better basis for responding to local health needs.

HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY FOR PEMBRIDGE

The Herefordshire Council has a statutory duty to undertake Housing Needs Studies across the County and Pembridge has been scheduled for a survey to be completed this year. It will be a postal survey consisting of a questionnaire and a reply paid envelope, which will be sent to every household in the Parish to complete and return. The results of the survey will indicate if there is a housing need in the Parish and will support any future development for affordable housing. The last survey was carried out in 2003.

MIDDLEBROOK FARM

After 67 years April 2008 marked the end of the Edwards family as tenant farmers at the 62.5 acre Middlebrook Farm just outside the village. The fourth generation have closed the gates for the last time and have said a sad goodbye to Middlebrook. The Edwards' came in 1941 from Mansel Lacy and ran a successful dairy herd and local milk round. In 1995 the milk round ended and the dairy cattle were gradually replaced with beef cross. The livestock were sold at Ludlow and the farm dispersal sale was held at the end of April. In 1956, 1996 and 2006 the three consecutive generations of the Edwards farming menfolk all died suddenly while working at the farm. All three are buried in Pembridge churchyard.



BIRDS, BATS AND BEES

Here in Pembridge we are fortunate to be surrounded by some very beautiful and fertile countryside, and it is important that we protect the variety of plants, trees and animals that make it so. That is no less true for manufacturers than it is for individuals, so in 2006, Kingspan Insulation commissioned a report from local Kington-based experts, Border Ecology, on the biodiversity of the Pembridge site.

Far from being a barren site, the results showed that it was actually a thriving habitat for a large number of species of plants, birds and bats, and Border Ecology were able to make a number of recommendations as to how this biodiversity could be protected and enlarged. Following on from this, Kingspan sponsored a student from Worcester University's MA in Sustainable Development Advocacy to explore what steps might be possible and to create a detailed action plan.

The first phase of the plan was put into action recently in a joint venture with local schools running from 16th May to 6th June, when children from Lady Hawkins' School, Wigmore High School and Shobdon & Kingsland Primary Schools were involved in creating bee and slow worm shelters and planting native wildflowers, climbers and shrubs. The children also put up boxes to provide new homes for birds, bats and insects, learning in the process about the variety of creatures and plants that inhabit their natural environment.

This is just the first phase of a year long project to develop the biodiversity of the Kingspan site and we are over the moon with the involvement of local schools and the energy, enthusiasm and positive "can-do" attitude of the pupils and staff alike. It has turned out to be a valuable learning tool for the children and hopefully an exercise that can be repeated.

But it isn't just the Kingspan site that has received attention: biodiversity in the village of Pembridge itself has also recently benefitted from funding from the Kingspan Insulation Community Trust with approval of a grant to develop and preserve the part of village green to the north east of the road bridge over the River Arrow as a conservation area. Feasibility studies are under way this year with a view to completing the project in 2009.

Other applications that have recently been accepted continue the environmental theme. At the Pembridge Show on 26 July, look out for the Arrowvale Environment Group, which will be promoting environmental awareness and encouraging people to take action to reduce their carbon footprint by distributing free low-energy light bulbs, vouchers for saplings and jute shopping bags, all funded by the Trust. A grant for the Pembridge Flower Festival in May 2009 has also been approved.

Meanwhile it isn't just the environment that the Community Trust supports: healthy exercise for young people is also an important element with recent applications for sports equipment for the pupils at Lady Hawkins' School being accepted. This latest round of grants will allow the further development of the highly successful boxercise classes and will further encourage budding gymnasts and rugby players.

As the village has many tourists and visitors particularly in the summer months, the Parish Council would appreciate seeing residents taking a little time to keep the areas near their properties clear of weeds and debris in an attempt to maintain the attractiveness of the village centre.

Your co-operation would be very much appreciated by everyone. Thank you. There is now a new waste bin in West Street, and also one opposite Sandiford Plock.

Speed Activated Traffic Signs for the Village

The Parish Council is currently in discussion with the Highways Section of Herefordshire Council to consider the possibility of installing 2 illuminated speed activated traffic warning signs later this year. This is primarily to ensure the safety of our schoolchildren.

Proposed changes to the Pembridge Village Conservation Area Boundary

The existing parish Conservation Area Boundary was first designated in 1974 by Leominster District Council. It is currently under review for amendment and the timescales for this project are:- The Parish Council first has about 4 weeks in which to respond to the proposals to Herefordshire Council, then after further negotiations on the joint proposals, and agreement being reached on these, full consultation will next be required by means of a local Public Meeting by Christmas 2008. Thereafter Herefordshire Council's management plans will be published by April 2009.

Thus read the endorsement on the flyer in the Old Steppes. As a result five village residents met in the car park on the 4th June to venture out on the Hereford Walking for Health outing led by Judy. We stood in glorious sunshine whilst the, now obligatory, H&S caveats (formally - be careful and use your common sense) were dispensed. Ken Myers, the parish footpath warden cycled by to wish the venture well. The route started with a gentle warm up along to West End where we passed through the kissing gate into the meadow with its newly shorn flock of sheep. Crossing Curl Brook and turning up the slope we entered a hay meadow, to the West of Byletts, resplendent with many wild flowers. At the far side of this field we encountered the first and only real obstacle of the route, a stile, which we all managed. Before crossing the Arrow there was some inconclusive discussions on what some rather exotic blacked winged insects were. Passing the Leen we made towards the Mill, noting the alterations where the footpath crosses the bed of the former railway track. Re-crossing the Arrow the home straight was up Bridge Street to a welcome and healthy, zero units locally produced, drink taken at The New Inn. Sitting outside chatting it was universally agreed that it had been a most pleasant and worthwhile
