Fungi are beginning to appear, for the first time I have found some local Chanterelles as well as the usual Field Mushrooms and the Ceps. Swallows and martins are struggling a bit; lets wish them well for their long trip over the sea and desert and for the trip back again!

The River is fishing really well at the moment with good numbers of Trout being caught on the Green and elsewhere. Fishing Club meeting is on the Village Green on the first Friday (5th) in September at 6pm. The next is Fri Oct 3rd at The New Inn to decide the future of the Club.

Although there is a 'consultation period' it is to be replaced with a service in the Village Hall car park. The opening hours are proposed as 7 hours per week. This is a truly serious blow to the community and must now make the village shop an even more difficult business proposition. Many elderly residents will find it very difficult to get to the car park and without the regular income from the P.O. I fear for the viability of the shop. Were we to lose it the village would be a much poorer place.

The savage cuts in the post office along with the privatisation of the service has done more to disrupt rural life than anything since Beeching destroyed the railway system in the early 1960's. We have been paying the price for his tunnel vision for the last 40 years and this axing of the post offices system will have the same effect. We in the rural areas no longer count. SPRINGBOARD TO SUCCESS FOR JUST £10,000

Pembridge Primary School are seeking to raise £10,000 towards a wooden sprung floor for their new school hall. Parents, former pupils, local businesses and community members are being asked to 'sponsor a floorboard' in return for their name (or any name they wish) being engraved, in perpetuity, on a wall mounted 'mini floorboard' in the new school hall, commemorating all donations. The minimum donation for a commemorative floorboard is £10. To-date, over £2,500 has been raised.

The new school hall will offer a great deal more space and flexibility for our popular and successful village school that continues to expand year-on-year with pupil numbers topping 100 in April. In addition, the hall will also be made available for use by the local community outside school hours. The inclusion of a wooden sprung floor will allow the children and future hall users a much safer and higher-quality environment in which to operate. With the school producing two, major theatrical productions annually and utilising it daily for assemblies, sport, dance, music and drama, a quality floor covering is essential. Donations can be made in 'mini floorboard blocks' of £10, £50, £100 or £500 with the size of donation recognized on the wall-mounted 'commemorative floorboard'. Last year's floods were a wake up call on climate change for all of us. If global warming is to be stopped everybody has to do their bit and that includes businesses like Kingspan Insulation.

What you may not know, is that for many years Kingspan has been ahead of the game on CO₂ emissions, keeping its impact on the environment to a bare minimum through its climate change action plan. The company regularly works with independent experts to help find opportunities to make improvements.

Earlier this year for instance, a combined heat and power (CHP) system was installed at Kingspan's plant, allowing the whole site to benefit from energy generated by a much more efficient system. It is expected that this will lead to a big reduction in annual carbon dioxide emissions.

Old fashioned lighting units have been replaced with more efficient modern equivalents, each one twice as effective as the older models. So far, more than 70% of the old units have been replaced cutting out unnecessary use of electricity.

On the factory floor where large motors were using more electricity than needed, the installation of energy demand control systems has further cut the amount of power being used.

Traditionally diesel-powered forklifts have been used to transport goods around the site, but new LPG versions can do the same job with far fewer carbon emissions, so more than 30 of the old forklifts are being replaced with these more efficient vehicles.

Kingspan takes both its environmental and community responsibilities seriously and this is one of the reasons for the creation of the Kingspan Insulation Community Trust. The first two years of the Trust have flown by and during this time nearly £100,000 has been distributed to some excellent local projects, including several to help the environment.

Funding was recently awarded to Lady Hawkins High School allowing them to help improve the school grounds and encourage biodiversity. This support has enabled students to plant cherry trees, daisies and a variety of shrubs in an area of the grounds that was previously just empty scrubland.

The students have also made the area more appealing to wildlife by installing bird boxes which will work together with the carefully chosen plants resulting in a suitable habitat for a number of different species. Bat boxes, a wormery and a bee bank have also been installed.

Not only will the students at the school benefit from the more appealing natural environment, the increased biodiversity will make for great learning opportunities and help to keep them fit, especially as they have done the lion's share of the planting work!

HEREFORDSHIRE COUNCILLORS REPORT

Your Refuse Collection Service

The current 3.5 million pound Waste Collection contract is up for renewal and a new contract will come into place in summer 2009. Although the Council has come under significant pressure to get rid of the weekly bag collection and provide a biweekly service we have decided to retain the principle of a weekly plastic bag collection. Given the issues of health and hygiene particularly in rural areas we believe ratepayers would want the opportunity to retain this service.

In addition at the moment recycling is offered to 72% of all the County's households including Pembridge village on a fortnightly basis. It is proposed in the new contract to extend this to all Herefordshire properties as is practically possible (over 90%). They will be collected fortnightly and include glass, paper, cardboard, metals, plastic but not clothing. We will do all the sorting at one of our central collection points. All these collections will be kerbside any elderly, disabled or infirmed resident can inform us of their condition and we will collect from anywhere agreed on their property.

Because we are collecting mixed recyclates including glass we will need to collect them in a rigid container. We will be giving all residents a choice as to the size of this wheeled rigid containers so it will be appropriate to their circumstances. In those rare situations where the resident has nowhere to store this bin we will provide a bagged service. This will be assessed by an officer before collections start. The cost of not going down this route is just not viable. The aim is to increase Herefordshire's recycling rate to well over 40% by 2012 and well beyond in the future. A failure to do so will increase the amount of Landfill Tax currently standing at £48 per tonne and could rise to nearly £200 per tonne.

Radiotherapy Centre

The Radiotherapy Centre for Hereford has now been confirmed. There has been a lot of work done by many people and organisations. As a Council we have been lobbying via our Health Scrutiny committee for the centre getting Worcestershire and Gloucestershire to support us. I have personally been liaising with Cllr Michael Jones the Leader of Powys Council to ensure the distance factor that people have to travel for treatment to Cheltenham is well understood.

The Chairman of the Herefordshire Primary Care Trust and myself have had meeting with Welsh Assembly officials in Cardiff to lobby them to continue to support our Acute Hospital in Hereford. Currently 10% of all patients treated at Hereford come from Wales and it is important that that they continue to help the financial viability and retain the services at our acute hospital.

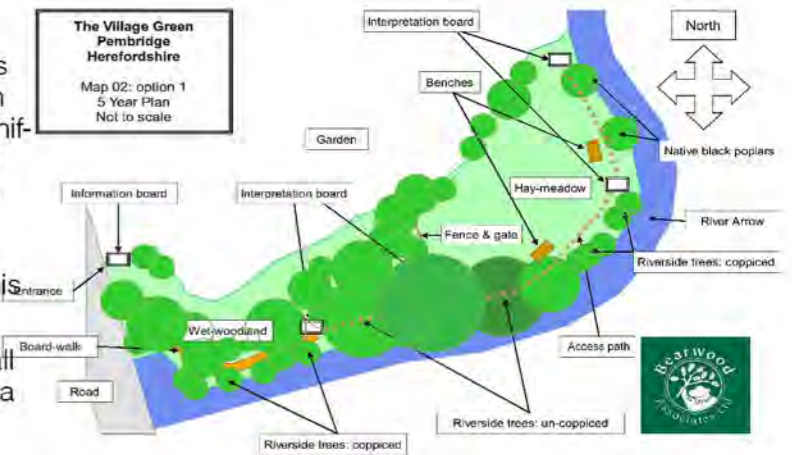

VILLAGE GREEN PROJECT



This report was prepared in advance of a meeting of the Parish Council on 27th August to approve a scheme proposed by the Village Green Working Group put together in conjunction with the consultant environmental company Bearwood Associates Ltd.

Following investigations by Bearwood Associates into the flora and fauna of the green it was felt that the creation of a wet woodland area and a natural grassland area would be most appropriate. The wet woodland would be an example of a rare habitat, most having been grubbed up in the distant past for meadow and pasture, and would enhance the biodiversity of the site. The result would have great amenity and educational value as there are no such local woodlands available to our community.

As a contrast to the woodland the development of a grassland area, by mowing and seeding, will produce an ecologically valuable species rich meadow.

The plan of the development shows a boardwalk/pathway to guide visitors through the area along with seats and interpretation boards.
