

## LEEN TIMES

Well, its that time of year again... the cows are all looking for a mate. Having had their calves over the last 3 months, they have all had their veterinary checkups, they are all comfortable inside and they are all sporting patches on their backs near their tails. These change colour when they come on heat so that we know when to get the AI man in. He will be serving 15-25 cows a day for 40 odd days. Then we shall turn in a number of bulls to clear up any that are left. Hopefully they will all be back in calf to calve in a 12-week period late next summer.

Most of the vegetables are picked, with just a few (5 tons) Leeks to get each week until January.

Over the summer many more fish passes have been built on the weirs of the river, It was really fascinating to see 18 Salmon have a go at one of the weirs in one quarter hour watch. They really are incredible animals, having been born in the river gravels 4 years ago, spending 2 years, probably only a few miles from Pembridge. Then 2 years out at sea with all the hazards there and finally up the river again to us. This really has been a well-berried autumn. We are beginning to see Fieldfares and Redwings getting stuck into them. If you have any Holly with berries-now is the time to beat them. With the natural food dwindling, it is time to get the bird feeders going to help those birds over the next few months. Give them a good scrub to reduce any infections. They will repay you many times over.

For the last few years I have had a brilliant team of volunteers helping me with wildlife jobs around the farm (and the village). We have coppiced and pollarded trees, planted hedges, cleared rides in the woods, plotted ancient trees on maps, cleared rubbish, put up bird boxes and done numerous other small jobs. If you would like to help out for a couple of hours on some Sunday mornings--do let me know. Important date:

## HEREFORDSHIRE COUNCILLORS REPORT

### Herefordshire Recycling success

It is over a year now since Herefordshire Council started recycling with the green wheelie bins and during that time residents have recycled over 28,500 tonnes of waste. That is the equivalent to the weight of 150 jumbo jets or 14,000 elephants. All the contents of the bins are taken to a centre just outside Worcester and are sorted into various categories.

This year due to the Festive days falling on the weekend all recycling and refuse collection days will be as normal. Please do not put plastic film, carrier bags, cling film or shiny gift wrap into wheelie bins and take textiles and foil to special banks at supermarket or the household waste site at Bridge Street in Leominster. ### Skating Rink in Hereford

For a special family treat this year visit Hereford City centre skating rink. It opens from 27th November until 31st December (except Christmas and Boxing days). ### Kington Cluster of Schools

The Governing bodies of Lady Hawkins High School and the four local primary schools of Pembridge, Kington, Eardisley and Ameley have agreed to form a soft cluster federation. The schools will keep their own budgets, identity and most importantly their premises but will in future share staff and administration cost in order to meet the challenges of tighter budgets in the future and retaining high standards of education for our pupils. This is very positive news for our local schools all of whom perform well.

### Preparing for Winter

After the worst winter for more than 30 years the Council has again a full stock of 6,500 tonnes of salt which is mined in Cheshire. The Councils contractors Amey use 15 gritters but as in previous years not all the 2044 miles of highways will be gritted. In our Parish the main road, Bridge street down to Milton crossroads and the Rhyse Lane as treated as priority. During winter gritting takes place between 35 to 70 times a year costing between £800,000 to over 2 million pounds.

### Pembridge Surgery

Herefordshire NHS pay the Kington GPs funding to retain our village surgery and I understand that will continue but they are interested in hearing how the local pharmacies can improve and expand their services. The 26 community pharmacies and ten dispensing practices in Herefordshire issued over 2.5 million prescriptions last year. ### FROM PONDS TO SCRUMS

What do frogs and rugby players have in common? Not a lot you might think, but in this neck of the woods they will both be seeing the benefit of the November round of grants from the Kingspan Insulation Community Trust. This strange combination came about because they both meet one of the four objectives that Trust funding supports, which (as you probably know by now) are: road safety, healthy recreation for young people, environmental conservation and encouraging biodiversity. Since it started in 2006 the healthy recreation category has seen a wide range of different kit, equipment and training being funded by Kingspan, not just for rugby but also for activities as diverse as football, basketball, cricket, hockey, athletics, tennis and bowls. Of course it doesn't stop there; with three other categories to try for, there has also been funding in the past for a whole variety of projects ranging from conservation areas, ponds and woodland, to road safety equipment for pre-school children and an environmental group website.

There have been six successful applications for grants this November. One was from Wigmore High School, who wanted to encourage their blossoming rugby players with a scrummaging machine to teach up and coming Martin (or Martina) Johnsons how to be effective and safe in that most physically demanding example of rugby teamwork – the scrum.

Another project has resulted in funding for a bug house, bird boxes, butterfly habitat and a bat box to provide safe and inviting homes for wildlife, together with observational equipment for pre-school children, showing that it is never too early to start appreciating the importance of the natural world.

The other successful projects include two primary school ponds, camping equipment for scouts, and a primary school outdoor study area that will help the pupils make the most of their existing wildlife garden. Remember, the grants run every year, so if you missed out on November, look out for the next deadline for applications towards the end of September next year.



## PEMBRIDGE HORTICULTURAL SHOW

At the recent AGM Pembridge show committee were very pleased with the success of 2010 show. Although entrance prices had been kept the same, as the previous year, with all children free, the show made a profit. The committee agreed to give donations to the Air ambulance, Pembridge village Christmas trees and money towards flowers and planters for Pembridge to help with next years entry in the Heart of England competition, in which we came second this year. The committee would like to appeal to Parishioners for help with next years show. We would love some more committee members but would be very happy if you would just like to work on show day. A lot of jobs are sitting down taking money for rides, skittles or raffle ticket selling.
