

## LEEN TIMES

Not a bad day today (mid Jan.), but it was a bit tricky in December. The snow and severe frost meant that water pipes froze, diesel engines wouldn't work, the milking units wouldn't work, we couldn't wash anything and the feed and milk lorries struggled valiantly to get on and off the farm. Fortunately we had plenty of feed and thanks to the sheer hard work of staff and family we managed to keep everything going. It is a credit to them and to Amey that they did, they all deserve a very big --Thank You.

The weather brought its own events, news and tragedies in the wildlife world. It was the heaviest spawning of salmon I have ever seen on the Arrow with no fewer than 12 redds (Nests with up to 5000 eggs) on the Village Green. Sadly the otters had a feast, with carcasses strewn around the river just below the bridge. Waxwings were seen in the village before the snow arrived to add to the redwings and fieldfares stripping the berries when the snow did arrive. Barn owls were seen still hunting in the coldest weather. Those that didn't survive included kite, barn owl, buzzard, kingfisher and several finches. Many that did survive owe their lives to the feed that was put out for them. Life has quickly returned to normal with woodpeckers knocking, all sorts of birds pairing up and the first snowdrops beginning to show.

We have a small, dedicated team that care for the Village Green (there cannot be many Village Greens that regularly have salmon and otters on them!). A couple of years ago we were lucky enough to get a grant from Kingspan to create a 'wildlife area'. This is about half- wet woodland and half- meadow. Infrastructure included a path, seats and waste points. Our team undertakes to maintain the infrastructure and provide access and very little else. We just leave it to the wildlife. I walk round about once a week (picking up rubbish) and have found it fascinating--so much going on all the time.

## HEREFORDSHIRE COUNCILLORS REPORT

### 2011 BUDGET

We all recognise that we are living in financially harder times and as a nation the government is paying 120 million pounds a day in interest payments. The Council has received its settlement from the government which has cut grants by 13.3% for next year meaning that over 10 million pounds worth of savings has to be funded in 2011/12.

The bulk of the savings will come from the cost of delivering services rather than cutting the services particularly to the most vulnerable. The impact of this is to reduce by a quarter of all managers in the Councils and delete another 250 posts from the organisation. We will continue to link up our administration with the local health service and County Hospital to save over 33 million pounds over 10 years; and support the functional and financial viability of the Hospital. There will be an extra 4 million pounds in the Adult Social Care budget to meet the growing demand of our maturing population and the Council will continue to fund concessionary fares but there will need to be a consultation over the next 18 months on the number of bus services and their cost. The Council is taking advantage of the government's offer of a grant of 2 million pounds to freeze the Council Tax level this April.

### WINTER WEATHER

Winter came not only early this year but with some of the lowest temperatures we have seen since 1982. The council's contractors Amey have done their best to keep open the priority routes and fill grit bins. For the second year running the sub contractor snow ploughs have also been used. In contrast to some other councils I also think our waste collection has been practical and reliable given the circumstances. The problem is now the potholes and I will remind of the hotline for reporting these on [streets@herefordshire.gov.uk](mailto:streets@herefordshire.gov.uk) or ring 01432261800.

### NEW CARE TEAMS

The Council working with GPs, the Primary Care Trust, the County and Community hospitals has developed teams which then offer a range of options to Doctors.

When a Doctor arrives to see a patient in their homes too often he was caught between two options either the County Hospital or leave them where they were alone. The new Instant Care Teams mean that there is a range of Care options. The scheme offers a care team going in within three hours offering a three day package. This could range from a single daily visit to 24 hr support in the home. The benefits are that the County Hospital has less full beds which means it concentrates on acute need which strengthens its business case. Patients remain in a setting they feel comfortable and can be supported by their family and community easier. The scheme still means that entry into County or Community hospital is still there. It is about offering a range of options that offer the appropriate package of care when needed.

The aim is to develop neighbourhood teams from across the partners to achieve a quality care for ourselves, family and friends working with GPs and other professionals around patients and services rather than bureaucrats.

## YOUR PARISH LENGTHSMAN

We are coming to the end of the second year of employing a lengthsmen in our Parish. The principal job of the lengthsmen is to provide minor maintenance and ensure proper drainage of non trunk roads and ensure road signs are clean and not obstructed.

Following a survey commissioned by the Parish Council in 2009 of road conditions the current year has seen the lengthsmen employed mainly clearing ditches, culverts and the cutting or clearing of grips (channels from the road through the verge to divert water into a drainage ditch) to improve the removal of surface water. This has entailed a significant amount of work as little has been done over recent years. It has been pointed out that the maintenance of roadside drainage ditches and culverts is the responsibility of the landowner of the adjacent land.

The work of the lengthsmen is financed by a grant from Herefordshire Council but after next year it will be reduced in value (if it is not discontinued) on the assumption that major rectification works will have been performed in the first three years and only minor maintenance will be required thereafter.

Any requests for work to be carried out by the lengthsmen should be forwarded to our Clerk for the Parish council's consideration.



## LUCTONIANS MINI & MIDI RUGBY TEAMS LOOK LIKE PRO'S

If you've been lucky enough to catch any of this seasons matches for the Luctonians Mini and Midi Rugby Teams, you may have had to look twice, as they could be mistaken for Pro's!

Luctonians provides youngsters in the area, including a number from Pembridge, with an opportunity to participate in competitive rugby, and importantly the Club understands the importance of investing in each individual player. As a result it is constantly looking for ways to help improve rugby skills, retain existing players and encourage wider participation.

Many of the young players were growing out of their current strip fast, and as the cost of a new shirt could make all the difference to whether players returned next season or not, the Club wanted to provide replacement shirts for next season's U8 - U12 players. It also wanted to remove any obstacles it could to finding a fresh cohort of U7 players for the new season.

With over 200 shirts needed, the cost added up to nearly £8,000, which the Club simply could not afford. So in order to keep the playing costs down the Club turned to the Kingspan Insulation Community Trust with an application for funding.

Luctonians have benefited previously from the Trust, with funding being granted on a number of occasions for new equipment. When this latest application was approved the new shirts soon proved to have the desired effect, with youngsters able to take real pride in their appearance and feeling further encouraged to participate.
