

LEEN TIMES

On the farm we have finally calved down the last few stragglers in the dairy herd. The cows are all milking really well, despite running out of grass and having to go onto silage early. Of course it has rained now and we have grass everywhere. Hopefully that will enable us to turn out really early next year.

The rain has also brought the river up, producing the annual sight of the Trout and Salmon running the weirs, made much easier by all the new fish passes that have been put in over the dry weather.

This year we have had such a bountiful wild harvest, especially mushrooms- There is an unwritten rule in the country that provided you have permission to be on the land, these are free for picking. They have been the biggest 'crop' I have seen for years. First we picked every one and gave lots away (handfuls, hatfuls, bagfuls and bucketfuls) then we start to get choosy and ask friends to help pick them. Finally we have become relaxed about them and think nothing of passing them by. Just a tip: (having seen so many different people pick mushrooms) take a sharp knife and always trim the stalks- this keeps the soil out and enables the mushroom to be rejected if it has 'grubs'. Always clear the mushroom of any debris or soil and handle very gently. It almost goes without saying that you must be completely confident that you know what a 'field mushroom' is!

I have had no Barn Owls reported but I did see one near Milton Cross the other evening.

The autumn fruits and seed are fast dwindling. Now is the time to disinfect the bird feeders and begin to feed the birds, but not too much until the hard weather comes or we move into the 'thin' times after the New Year.

I have a large wood to plant up this winter with native trees, I could do with any of those seedling Oaks, Holly, Hazel, etc. that you find in the garden at this time of year.

Finally, spare a thought for the Hedgehog- leave the pile of rubbish in the corner of the garden.


..... the bonfire was brilliant, the fireworks were fantastic and there were plenty of people. It was an extremely well organised and very professionally run event.

There are clear areas over Pembridge Village and the surrounding area which are subject to noise restriction from aircraft and helicopters flying in and out of Shobdon airfield. Hereford Flying Club is aware that these areas are being violated from time to time by pilots flying over them. Shobdon management team is anxious to reduce the nuisance and is asking for reports of any such flights to be reported to them. All such reports will be logged and followed up. It would be helpful to state the date, time and direction of flight, and to distinguish between a light aircraft and a helicopter. HEREFORDSHIRE COUNCILLORS REPORT

Marches Redundant Building Grants Programme

We have received a £1.5 million grant from the Governments Growth Fund to support small businesses and start-ups in Herefordshire, Shropshire and Telford to bring unused buildings back into productive economic use.

The scheme will provide up to £50,000 to small businesses to transform redundant buildings with the aim to create over 300 direct jobs. This is similar to the previous successful scheme we used to run.

Budget Savings

Following the Cut in Government grants we have made over £10 million of savings in 2011/12 in the 145 million council budget we now need to prepare for a further £7 million reductions in 2012/13. The aim is to identify the savings in the way we deliver the services rather than the services themselves.

During the last year we have minimised the reductions in services. In our parishes the mobile library service has been stopped, some changes to bus services and tourist information centres have been outsourced.

At a recent meeting I attended which looked at all locally owned public property it was pleasing to note that Hereford & Worcester Fire Authority will be keeping open all our local fire stations including Kington, Eardisley, Kingsland and Leintwardine. The Police consider there may be some savings to join up their station in Kington with the fire service. On the Health front the new Surgery in Kington is being build and plans are also afoot for a similar build at Leintwardine.

Public Health Annual Report

The annual report has been published giving information on the health and wellbeing of the local population.

Not surprisingly the levels of cancer and heart disease are the biggest problems in our County. Herefordshire experiences significantly lower mortality rates from cancer at 150 per 100,000 than West Midlands 175 per 100,000 and 172 per 100,000 in England. The opening of the new centre in Hereford will now mean that local people can get treatment locally rather than travel to Cheltenham.

Heart mortality rates have fallen by almost 50% since 1996 but that is less than regional and national figures. High levels of cholesterol, obesity and hypertension are three main risk factors. NHS health checks programme invites all people between 40 -74 to be regularly checked over. Another concern for us is the falls particularly in older people. In 2010/11 there were 760 fall related admissions of older people to the Hospital in the county with 200 hip fractures. The cost on the local NHS is put at £2.48 million plus social care costs. The County is developing a prevention strategy which encourages greater awareness and activity.

The number of people killed or seriously injured on our roads has fallen with 61 being the recorded figure for 2010. The disproportionately high level of young people 16 to 25 is a major concern and 18% of the figures are motorcyclists.

KINGSPAN PEMBRIDGE NEWSLETTER

TRUST EXPANDING TO HELP NEIGHBOURING COMMUNITIES

This year is a special anniversary for Kingspan Insulation, marking 25 years since we made the airfield between Shobdon and Pembrige our home. Since then, Kingspan has played an active role in supporting local community projects, and five years ago that support was formalised with the creation of the Kingspan Insulation Community Trust.

The Trust has given thousands of pounds to help organisations within the Parishes of Shobdon, Pembrige, Kingsland and Sherburn-in-Elmet (N Yorks). This money has helped to promote the Trust's four main aims: physical recreation for young people; ecology; bio-diversity and road safety.

The funds have been used for everything from supporting the Arrowvale Environment Group, purchasing equipment for youth sport, to the creation of wildlife areas.

Given the current economic downturn, the need for support for this type and range of projects has never been greater. The Trustees have therefore been carefully considering ways of expanding the Trust so that it is able to provide funding to projects, both within the current Parishes and in neighbouring communities.

As a result, from 2012, projects within the catchment areas of Wigmore High School, Lady Hawkins' School, Earl Mortimer College and Tenbury High School can apply for funding from the Trust, along with projects in the Parish of Sherburn-in-Elmet. Over the coming months, two new Trustees will be sought to represent the new areas and help decide which projects to support.

The changes will mean that the Trust remains a strong supporter of, and contributor towards, local projects, and the Trustees are looking forward to seeing a whole range of fresh and exciting applications for funding in 2012.
