Our charity shop week at Kington, at the end of August, was a great success with the sum of £2,200 being raised for church funds. This excellent achievement was the result of very hard work on the part of many people in Pembridge and their endeavour and expertise in raising quality goods to sell and making our shop look so inviting to the many buyers. Our thanks go especially to Jen Myers who spent many hours coordinating the week with the Fund Raising Committee: her enthusiasm for the task was amazing!

Thanks also to Diane Williams and Pat Stokes who also amazed us by turning a small shop into the best Department Store in Kington! The shop was manned all week by a very enthusiastic band of shopkeepers – so our grateful thanks to them. Many thanks also to everyone in and around Pembridge who donated items for the shop and helped in other ways to make our week such a success.

Pembridge Parish Council

Ward Councillor's Report

Dealing with the Councils Budget

The inescapable facts about the current financial position facing all Councils are stark. In Herefordshire we have to find savings of approx. £57m between 2010 and 2015 (this amounts to over 1/3 of our budget) and have been put on notice by the Government that a further 15% is likely to be cut from central funding after 2015. The fact that we are a small local authority delivering services over a large geographical area and haven't the level of reserves of the longer established councils impacts on us greater still.

Herefordshire Council Social care Costs

The Council commissions 14,000 hours of home care per week for over 1,000 people. Nearly three quarters of all these people are older people, 14% people with physical & sensory disabilities, 11% people with learning disabilities and 3% people with mental health disabilities.

The Council pays a basic rate of £14 . 90 per hour for both week and weekend working with a premium rate of £17.13 payable in certain rural areas.

There are currently 51 registered domiciliary care providers. Current contracts are being extended to March next year pending a review of costs. The service needs to be redesigned with the aim of delivering financial savings and ensuring that best value for money is achieved for the council and service users while not destabilising the local market.

The County has over 40 registered residential care homes with approx. 400 people equivalent to just over a quarter of all the beds paid for by Herefordshire Council. Locally this includes The Garth, Lynhales, Kington Court, Waverley and Leominster Res & Nursing Home. The Council is seeking to contain the costs of this provision and has been working with the homes to establish a fair rate. Existing rates vary depending on degree of care but have a baseline in excess of £400 per week and can be over £570 in complex cases.

Adoption service

During the last 5 years our service saw 58 children adopted most of these children, all under 16 years old, having been previously looked after by our fostering families. We are currently looking at joining up the service across the West Mercia region and having one adoption service for Herefordshire, Shropshire, Worcestershire, Telford and the Wrekin.

Library Services

Future options for this service were taken to Cabinet meeting on 19th September. As I indicated before the May Council meeting the proposal to close the service down to one library in Hereford with no core service was one that I would not support and that we should retain our market town libraries/info but consult on a reduction of opening hours. In most sites our library service is now joined up with other services and this needs to be reflected in our thinking. The option allows individual considerations to reflect the individual offers of each site.

We are in discussions with the communities of Colwall, Weobley and Leintwardine to transfer their status to community libraries.

The importance of retaining a core service should not be forgotten. This provides the support to our existing community libraries, a service to over 40 nursing homes, 260 housebound people, internet service etc. We should seek to join the housebound delivery service with the daily care service patrons receive.

Museum services

The options for future delivery of this service have been explored with representatives of local organisations and political groups. The emerging preferred option is for a reduction in services to be placed in an existing trust. The formation of a new trust just for our museum service is considered not practicable as our offer is too small. Also, there is the cost of setting it up and the time that takes. A trust will need an element of core funding for specialist personal and service support. The trust needs to provide efficient and sound professional support to the back office as well a competent and professional front line service.

It is not possible to achieve the savings identified by the Chief Executive last April as we wish to retain our collections and Friar Street where they are properly housed. I have inquired and I can confirm we have no items worth £100k or more.

New Highway Contractors Balfour Beatty

Balfour Beatty took over the Highway contract from Amey on 1st September. They are a national company who also do the highways for Warwickshire, Coventry, Solihull and Wiltshire. It is a 10 year contract worth £200 million with £20 million front loaded for C and unclassified roads. I am working with the Parish Council to identify potential resurfacing projects to place in the programme. Trailer Permits for the 'tip'

Not a gripping piece of news this, but one which could catch you out. The permits scheme allowing householders to use a trailer to take rubbish to a Recycling Centre is being revised and permits issued prior to 1 October '13, will not be valid in 2014. Under the new scheme permits are again available free of charge to residents to deposit domestic waste. Each household can apply for up to 12 permits per year and use one each month. You can apply on -line at www.letswasteless.com or call 0845 607 2007.

Householders can make as many visits as they like without a permit in a private vehicle or with a trailer, so long as it is no more than 1.3 meters in length.

Leen Times

Over the last few weeks the calves have been coming thick and fast, the milk tank has been filling up and the fields round the house have groups of calves dancing about like spring lambs. These days they are all fed with a mobile 'milk bar' that can suckle up to 50 at a time - they are much fitter and healthier than I have seen baby calves for years. It is slightly odd to see all the multitude of different colours. Years ago they were all black and white 'Friesians' - now, because of problems with restocking after TB and a deliberate policy of cross breeding, we have introduced Jersey, Guernsey, Shorthorn, Ayrshire and foreign breeds such as Montbelliarde or Brown Swiss. This has enabled us to produce as much milk as possible from that most natural of feeds, grass.

After a gap of perhaps 15 years we are keeping a few pigs for our own use. Killing a pig used to be such a common thing to do on farm, with the meat shared round, converted into pies or salted down. Now it is somewhat easier with the deep freeze, but there is still a day of intense work to convert the pig into usable packages for modern families. There is also that great feeling of being self-sufficient that has been all but lost: many days, everything we have on the plate is produced off the farm.

Talking of that, this autumn has been one of the most abundant I can remember for blackberries and mushrooms, we seem to have been eating them for months. Hopefully there will be a few sloes about after the first frost for the usual winter tipple.



The butterflies appeared in abundance on the buddleia with many more different varieties added to the list. I hadn't realised before how many moths use the plant both in the day and at night. It was interesting to watch the daily visit of a single hornet that would patrol like a Spitfire around the bushes knocking off the butterflies as he went, before expertly catching a fly and proceeding to eat it a few inches from my face! I have been sent some stunning pictures of butterflies from round the parish.

It looks as if it could be a good acorn year. If anyone would like to grow a few on in pots or if a healthy wild tree or shrub is found in the wrong place in the garden, pop it into a pot - I can usually find somewhere to plant them.
